ALPINE CONVENTION (AC)

An international legally binding treaty dedicated to the sustainable development and protection of the Alps

Approach

Executed via thematic protocols under the leadership of ministries of the environment, supported by expert Working Groups and Observer bodies

Purpose

Provides a legally binding framework for cooperation and establishes guidelines to ensure environmental conservation and sustainable development for the Alpine region

Stakeholders

National Ministries, other public administrations, NGOs and sectoral organizations, the European Union, citizens and youth

EU funding programme for transnational cooperation

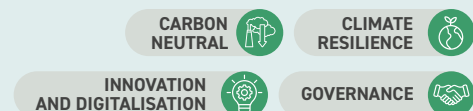
Purpose

EU macro-regional strategy led by Alpine regions driving institutional cooperation and pooling resources

Experts in relevant policy fields get together in Action Groups to strategically deal with shared territorial needs

Purpose

Cross-Alpine strategic framework inducing change on common priorities at a policy level
